# **Medicaid Changes**

Information regarding the January 1, 2018 Georgia Medicaid changes.

#### What parents should know:

As of January 1, 2018, Georgia's Medicaid Program has started to provide coverage for autism spectrum disorder (ASD) services for members under the age of 21.

#### How to qualify for autism services under Medicaid:

- 1. Your child must have Georgia Medicaid.
- 2. Your child must have a diagnosis of autism, Rett's syndrome, Asperger's, pervasive developmental disorders or other childhood disintegrative disorders that include a severity level (1-3). The diagnosis must be provided by a licensed physician, psychologist or other licensed professional based on the DSM-5 criteria.
- 3. The service your child needs will need to be authorized by Medicaid before services can start.

### How to ensure your child is covered & authorized for services:

To ensure your child is covered, you will need to reach out to the provider who diagnosed your child to obtain a copy of the full evaluation report, including the severity level. This document is required to obtain services.

## What to do if you have a diagnosis but no severity level:

**Option #1:** Reach back out to your diagnosing provider and ask them to add a level to your child's diagnostic report.

**Option #2:** Contact a community provider to ask for an appointment with a qualified provider to receive a level for autism coverage.
